Further Education Courses continued



BTEC Level 3 Extended National Diplomas

These established national and internationally recognised qualifications are an alternative to A levels and assists with entry to university, other further education studies and employment. On successful completion, these BTEC Level 3 National Diplomas are equivalent to 3 A levels.

Course Duration

2 years

For entry to these courses, you should:

Be at least 16 by 1st September in the year of entry and have any of the following:

- 4 A*-C grade GCSEs to include English Lang for the ND Business Retail course (Or key/functional skills in English Lang)
- 4 A*-C grade GCSEs to include English Lang and preferably a creative subject for the ND Fashion Clothing and Graphic Design course
- BTEC 1st Diploma (in Art or Fashion for Fashion Clothing course)
- Intermediate GNVQ in an appropriate subject

Art & Design (Graphic Design)

This graphic design course is set in a fashion retail context to introduce you to the main principles and practices, both current and commercial. It is a vocationally related, full time, two year course. Theoretical, practical skills and knowledge will be covered in the 18 units of study. Emphasis will be on drawing and illustration, research skills, the study of lettering, computer aided and digital design.

Selection process

To assess your suitability for this course, the selection process will include an application. If this is successful an interview will follow, where one or more members of the course team will see you. This will allow us to gain a good idea of your self motivation and commitment, as well as interest in art and graphic design. It will also give you an opportunity to ask questions about the course.

You will need to bring your Art portfolio with you to interview. This can be from any artistic background, e.g. photography, drawing, computer art.

Structure

Your lessons will involve group and individual activities, presentations, tutor input, independent research, projects, discussions, role plays etc. Realistic work experience will be arranged using our industry network and through simulated and live projects. The course is 100% course work assessed and assessments for each unit include projects, portfolios, presentations, group work and reports.

This is a full time course and students are expected to attend all lessons. Emphasis is placed on good attendance and studentship. Independent study time is assigned between classes so students can carry out their course work and assignments.

This BTEC National Diploma is well suited to gain employment in a variety of graphic design settings such as, Branding, Corporate Identity, e-Commerce Design, Public Relations, Advertising, Marketing, Packaging, Publishing, TV, Film, Events and Exhibitions and in particular in fashion retail. Alternatively it will assist you in gaining entry into Higher Education in a range of fields associated with graphic design such as an undergraduate or foundation degree.

Business (Retail)

This vocationally related, full time, two year course, covers a wide range of key retail business topics suitable for those seeking careers in the retail industry, commerce, administration, or wanting to progress to higher education. At the FRA this course is set in a fashion retail context and draws on its specialist expertise in this industry.

Selection process

To assess your suitability for this course, the selection process will include an application. If this is successful an interview will follow, where one or more members of the course team will see you. This will allow us to gain a good idea of your self motivation and commitment, as well as interest in the business and fashion retail industry. It will also give you an opportunity to ask questions about the course.

Structure

Your lessons will involve group and individual activities, presentations, tutor input, independent research, projects, discussions, role plays etc. Realistic work experience will be arranged using our industry network. The course is 100% course work assessed and assessments for each unit include projects, portfolios, presentations, group work and reports.

Careers Prospects and What Next?

This BTEC National Diploma will be well suited to gain employment in a variety of retail related areas, in particular fashion retail. Amongst these are store and head office administration, administrative assistants for buying, merchandising, PR and marketing departments, store management trainee positions and junior visual merchandising assistants. Alternatively it will assist you in gaining entry into Higher Education in a range of fields such as business, management, retail and business administration.



Art & Design (Fashion Clothing)

This exciting 2 year course ideal for students aiming to progress towards Higher Education and careers in the fashion industry. You will be taught by a range of experienced tutors, developing your skills in units selected alongside sustained project work. During the first year of the course, projects will address a range of career opportunities that you can follow.

As the course progresses your tutors will help you compile a portfolio for application to specialist degrees in Fashion. The course concludes with a final major project in which you will have the freedom to explore your own creative interests in depth. Throughout the course there are opportunities to enhance your understanding by visiting London galleries.

The focus of this course is to offer the prospective student the opportunity to study in a stimulating fashion industry environment. One of the unique characteristics of the course is the strong links with the fashion industry around the country, which enables students to gain first hand knowledge and experience of the industry. The course is aimed at students with a great enthusiasm for fashion and some previous experience in fashion or art and design subjects. Dedication & commitment is desirable in order to achieve the diploma.



Selection Process

To assess your suitability for the National Diploma in Art and Design (Fashion Clothing), the selection process will include an application. If this is successful an interview will follow, where one or more members of the course team will see you. You will be required to bring with you at least one or more pieces of artwork which demonstrates your creative ability and how you approach ideas. This can be in the form of photos, drawings, 3D models or collage paintings. This will allow us to gain a good idea of your self-motivation and commitment, as well as interest in the fashion industry. It will also give you an opportunity to ask questions about the course.

Structure

The course is 100% coursework assessed, concluding with a final major project where you can explore your own creative interests. Often assessments are combined into projects to enable links between units, this ensures projects are exciting and stimulating

and can be individual or group work. The course covers both theoretical and practical approaches relevant to current practice in the fashion industry.

Level 4 Diploma in Buying & Merchandising

The focus of this course is to offer the prospective student the opportunity to study in stimulating fashion retail head office functions. One of the unique characteristics of the course is the strong links with fashion retail head offices around the country, which enables students to gain first hand knowledge & experience of buying and merchandising.

For entry to the Level 4 Diploma in Buying and Merchandising you should:

- be at least 18 by 1st September in the year of entry
- have 1 A Level Pass plus 3 GCSEs (including Maths and English Lang) at C grade or above or an equivalent qualification or an equivalent Level 3 qualification e.g. Level 3 Diploma in Fashion Retail, National Diploma etc
- have equivalent qualifications or professional experience
- show motivation to succeed on the course
- demonstrate good communication and calculation skills

Course Duration

1 year

Selection Process

To assess your suitability for the Level 4 Buying & Merchandising, the selection process will include an interview. If your application is successful you will be invited to an interview, where one or more members of the course team will see you. You will be required to make a presentation for up to 5 minutes, that demonstrates your enthusiasm and aptitude for the course. You should research a brand and create a verbal presentation, to include up to three A3 boards. This will allow us to gain a good idea of your self-motivation and commitment, as well as interest in the buying and merchandising industry. It will also give you an opportunity to ask questions about the course. Additionally, you will sit a Maths test to ascertain your skills and accuracy at calculations.

Structure

The course is delivered using a range of techniques to ensure students gain a practical understanding of fashion business skills. It covers both theoretical and practical approaches relevant to current practice in the UK. The curriculum will address practical and professional skills in communication negotiation, and presentation. Students are introduced to the complex integrated working of buying and merchandising functions. To begin with students will study the market context in which fashion buyers and merchandisers function along with the commercial implications for product ranges. Aspects affecting the supply chain are studied including product market strategies and implications of external forces. Students will also study an introduction to garment technology.

Combined with work placements within a head office environment in both Buying and Merchandising functions, students are able to gain a comprehensive view of fashion retail buying and merchandising, enabling them to enter this area of the industry.

Units Include

- The Buying Environment in Fashion Retail
- Understanding the Sourcing Environment in Fashion Retail
- Range Building in Fashion Retail
- Merchandising for Fashion Retail
- Developing Retail Relationships
- Pixel Based Image Manipulation

Other subject areas covered on the course include: supply chain; trend research; sourcing and negotiating; planning and budgeting; allocation and garment technology. Students will undergo extended practical workshops combined with two head office work placements. Students will be required to complete a final major project in the last term of the academic year.

What's next after the level 4 Diploma?

With a Level 4 Diploma in Buying and Merchandising you will have every advantage to enter MAA or BAA roles in head office with the aim to progress faster along their career path.

Level 4 Diploma in Visual Merchandising

The programme for the Level 4 Diploma in Visual Merchandising is intended for students who wish to gain an entry level position in visual merchandising. You will explore how visual merchandising is a key part of the marketing operation for major retailers. In department stores and fashion multiples the visual merchandiser ensures windows and interiors promote the stores brand identity. Visual Merchandisers are responsible for designing and commissioning windows and in-store display schemes, understanding floor layouts and fixture requirements as well as managing in-store signage and graphics.

For entry to the Level 4 Diploma in Visual Merchandising, you should:

- be at least 18 by 1st September in the year of entry
- have 1 A Level Pass plus 3 GCSEs C grade or above or an equivalent qualification or an equivalent Level 3 qualification e.g. Level 3 Diploma in Fashion Retail, National Diploma etc
- have equivalent qualifications or professional experience
- show motivation to succeed on the course
- demonstrate a creative interest in Visual Merchandising

Course Duration

1 year

Selection Process

To assess your suitability for the Level 4 Diploma in Visual Merchandising, the selection process will include an interview. If your application is successful you will be invited to an interview, where one or more members of the course team will see you. You will be required to bring a portfolio with you to the interview. This will allow us to gain a good idea of your self-motivation and commitment, as well as interest in the visual merchandising industry. It will also give you an opportunity to ask questions about the course.

Structure

The Level 4 Diploma in Visual Merchandising offers a unique one year intensive programme providing you with the opportunity to gain or build on previous experience to establish your future career aspirations. The course introduces students' to the significance of visual merchandising in the retail industry. To begin with students will study the market context in which the visual merchandising function and the commercial implications are adopted for business success.

Units Include

- Window Design
- In-store VM
- Signage and Graphics
- Mannequin Dressing
- Store Concepts
- Pixel Based Digital Image Manipulation
- Developing Personal Progression

Students will undergo extended practical workshops combined with a work placement. Students will be required to complete a final major project in the last term academic year.

With a Level 4 Diploma in Visual Merchandising you'll be well placed to apply for junior roles in visual merchandising in stores with the aim to progress faster along your career path.

Higher Education Courses

These courses are part of the portfolio of courses in the School of Management and Science at the London College of Fashion, and the University of the Arts, London is the Awarding Body

Higher Certificate in Fashion Retail (Merchandising)

The Cert HE Fashion Retail Merchandising course is designed to prepare students for a career in fashion retail merchandising. Retail merchandisers and their teams ensure that the right products appear in the right place, at the right time, at the right price and in the right quantities. Merchandisers work closely with buying and store operations teams to maximise profit and ensure that stock is properly monitored and available, and that under performing lines are stopped and stock of popular products is increased. Merchandisers analyse information, including sales figures, and devise strategies to boost sales and maximise profits, as well as planning promotions with marketing and PR teams.

The course balances practical and creative skills with theoretically based studies, together with broader academic studies which allow you to see the context of your particular study in the wider perspectives of fashion, society and the environment. Work experience opportunities and industry-led projects are features of the course.

Course Duration

1 year

Structure

Term One

Introduction to Study in Higher Education
Principles of Fashion Retail Merchandising

Term Two

Introduction to Cultural and Historical Studies
Fashion Retail Merchandising Skills

Term Three

In the third term you will undertake the Negotiated Individual Project unit. This will give you the opportunity to work on an individual project. The specific topic and nature of the project will be negotiated with your tutor. The project will include practical and theoretical aspects, and will be directly related to a fashion retail merchandising scenario where the challenges faced by fashion merchandisers can be explored, together with the close working relationships with buyers and other departments.

You will have opportunities for fieldwork and research, as well as product handling and demonstration of presentation skills. Your project will have an operational focus and you will begin to look at the industry from a commercial viewpoint.

Application & Selection Process

Entry to this course is highly competitive: applicants are expected to achieve, or already have, the course entry requirements detailed below.

- One 'A' level pass (80 UCAS tariff points required) PLUS five GCSE passes in other subjects at grade C or above
- or • BTEC National Diploma in a fashion related subject
- or • NVQ level 3 in a related subject
- or • A one year Foundation Diploma in Art and Design PLUS five GCSE passes at grade C or above
- or • Access course in a relevant subject or equivalent awards (*Preferred subjects include English, Maths, Art and/or Business.*)

This course requires a minimum **80 UCAS tariff points**. Exceptionally, applicants who do not meet these course entry requirements may still be considered if the course team judges the application demonstrates additional strengths and alternative evidence.

English Language requirements

All classes are conducted in English. If English is not your first language you will be asked to provide evidence of your English language ability when you enrol.

The level required by the University for this course is IELTS 5.5 with a minimum of 4.5 in any one skill.

Applicants who will need a Tier 4 student visa in order to study in the UK will have to achieve a minimum of 4.5 in each skill, which is line with the University requirements.

Future Careers and Graduate Prospects

This course leads to employment in the fashion retail merchandising sector. Recent graduates have gained employment with, for example, Topman, House of Fraser, Karen Millen, Mulberry and Tesco Online.

Foundation Degree in Fashion Retail Management

The FdA Fashion Retail Management course is designed to prepare students for a career in fashion retail as managers. The industry requires well-informed, commercially-minded fashion retail managers who have learnt the skills to increase profitability, reduce waste and shrinkage, and increase productivity whilst providing better customer service and increasing staff morale. The fashion industry is highly competitive with a constantly changing set of business challenges, including retail internationalisation.

This course seeks to produce graduates who will be top quality retail managers who can maximise productivity in the face of international competition, demanding customers and changing shopping patterns. These managers will be creative and forward-looking individuals with a global perspective, who are equipped to use their skills in any size or kind of retail outlet, whether virtual or physical. The course balances practical and creative skills with theoretically based studies, together with broader academic studies which allow you to see the context of your particular study in the wider perspectives of fashion, society and the environment.

Work experience opportunities and industry-led projects and collaborations are features of the course. In the second year students undertake a ten-week work placement in store. High-achieving graduates from this course have the opportunity to do a third year of specialist studies to gain a BA Honours degree at the London College of Fashion.

Course Duration

2 years

Structure

At the end of the course you will undertake the Individual Major Project, which will give you the opportunity to undertake a self-directed project that consolidates and extends your knowledge and skills. Your project will include planning, research, ideas development and recommendations, and will include elements of both practice and theory. You will negotiate the specific topic and detail of the project with your course tutor. Your project brief will allow you to demonstrate creativity and entrepreneurship, at the same time as producing an outcome with a feasible and realistic commercial application. Assessment is continuous and methods include written reports, case studies, essays, presentations and integrated projects.

Application & Selection Process

Entry to this course is highly competitive: applicants are expected to achieve, or already have, the course entry requirements detailed below.

- One 'A' level pass (80 UCAS tariff points required) PLUS three GCSE passes in other subjects at grade C or above (inc English and Maths)
- or • BTEC National Diploma in a fashion related subject
- or • NVQ level 3 in a related subject
- or • A one year Foundation Diploma in Art and Design PLUS five GCSE passes at grade C or above
- or • Access course in a relevant subject or equivalent awards (*Preferred subjects include English, Maths, Art and/or Business.*)

This course requires a minimum **80 UCAS tariff points**. Exceptionally, applicants who do not meet these course entry requirements may still be considered if the course team judges the application demonstrates additional strengths and alternative evidence.

English Language requirements

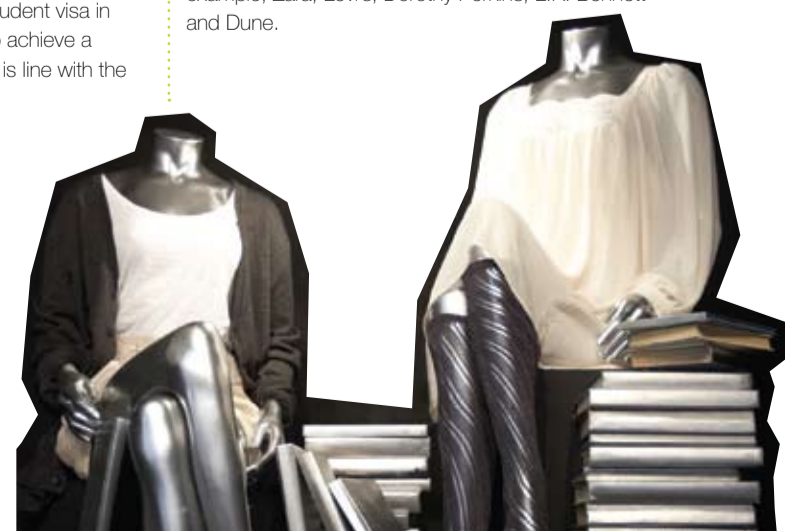

For Further Education courses, enrolment takes place early in September 2012 and you will be required to enrol in person. Course induction follows thereafter. For Higher Education courses enrolment and induction is at the end of September.
